ABOUT ETHICS PAPER

The Ethics Paper is one of the key determinants of cracking the UPSC Civil Services Mains Examination or for that matter even getting in the top 100 of the final lists. This paper has the **potential of scores ranging from an average of 125 to a high of 160 marks**, as opposed to papers such as GS Papers 1 where the average hovers from 100 marks to a high of around 130 marks. Thus, its effective weightage in the total score is very high

Challenges Faced by Students

- Firstly, the challenge with the GS IV Paper is the **lack of a single source point or reference book** to comprehensively cover the entire syllabus. Students often get confused with the dispersed material present in different reference books.
- Secondly, it also has a very capacious and porous boundary given that anything under the sun can be asked in the Ethics Paper. While most candidates do not spend more than 15 days to prepare for the Ethics Paper, the wise utilisation of a brief period like a fortnight is also challenging due to the lack of clarity on what and how to study for this Paper.
- Thirdly, the ability to **answer quote-based questions**, which, to some extent, requires a wide reading base, creative thinking and conceptual understanding which may not materialize for most students immediately.
- Fourthly, we have seen that a large majority of our own students of MGP do not do justice to the paper, despite Mains experience and do poorly in GS IV Tests. This course tries to offer a solution to that.

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Meaning of Ethics

- derived from Ethikos = custom or habit
- as study = part of moral philosophy
- as a practice = set of norms that aim to guide our conduct in right direction.

Approaches to the study of Ethics

- meta ethics
- descriptive ethics
- normative ethics

Sources of Ethics

- God & Religion → legitimacy to ethical rules + fear of punishment + brings uniformity in social + cultural practices, works as a glue to bind society;
- Intuition & Reason → sense of reasoning, critical thinking
- Politics & Constitution → set norms of right and wrong
- society → cultural norms of society define ethics - group and individual
- Law → codified societal ethics + violation of law is unethical
- for the society;
- Virtuous Persons → example of good human beings; (e.g. *Maryada Purushottam*)

Determinants of Ethics

- *sthan* → courageous in battlefield vs courage in road rage ;
- *kala* → nearly every cultural practice vilified now was once accepted and even held in high regard ; e.g. slavery in USA, untouchability, Sati in India etc.
- *patra* → person/ character, who we are;

Ethics & Morality → used interchangeably, but different. relative terms

Morality	Ethics

Moral Absolutism

- moral principles are absolute, valid, and true irrespective of context and situation
- certain actions are inherently right or wrong;
- source of strength to the state - law making for all;
- gives strength to religion ;
- Criticisms → promotes absolutism, exclusivism, strong state, religious intolerance, fundamentalism, no scope of revision or reinterpretation, does not believe in social change, history is full of examples where entire societies have been wrong; War in the name of democracy propagation;

Moral Relativism

- moral propositions (such as do not steal) do not reflect objective moral reality; depend on culture, context etc.
- Concerns → problem of self contradiction (“all moral truths are relative”); used to justify War;
- Anthropocentric view, “Homo Mensura” → man is the measure of all things ;
- Positives → supports cultural diversity, cultural relativism, enshrines in doctrine of; at the core of Indian ethics, Jain doctrine of Anekantavada ; promotes religious tolerance ; check against terrorism/ fundamentalism ;

Final Position

- Madhyam marg of Buddha; Some laws are eternal = sanatan dharma; some change with time;
- for societal and political progress → relativism is necessary, to preserve society - some absolutism is needed.
