THE PROBLEM WE ARE SOLVING

Prelims is not tough because you didn't study.

It is tough because three things break at the same time — the syllabus outruns you, what you read doesn't stay, and the paper you practised for is not the paper you get.

01

The width and breadth

Eight static subjects, a dozen standard books, and no finish line. You complete Polity, start Economy, and Polity quietly leaks away. Without a sequence, coverage becomes a lottery.

02

Retention and recall

You read Fundamental Rights in October. UPSC asks about Article 20(3) in May. Reading once builds recognition — "I have seen this" — but the exam pays only for recall, under a clock, with negative marking.

03

A moving target

"How many of the above are correct?" Statement traps. Options that are 90% true. The pattern and difficulty shift every year, so a strategy that worked for someone in 2024 is no guarantee for you in 2027.

Two kinds of aspirant. One missing system.

PROFILE A

First attempt in 2027, preparing by self-study

- ☐ I own the books, but I have no sequence and no deadline per subject

- ☐ I don't know what "done" looks like for a subject

PROFILE B

Written Prelims before. Missed the cut-off again.

- ☐ I have read everything at least once — and still miss by 5–10 marks

- ☐ My mocks score well; the real paper feels different
- ☐ I know the concepts. I don't trust my recall on exam day

HOW PRELIMS SPRINT WORKS

One loop. Six days a week. Every subject.

Sprint is not "classes plus a test series". It is a single daily cycle in which learning, note-making and testing are built into each other — so nothing you learn is left un-revised for more than a day.

STEP 1 • 4:30 PM Learn A 3-hour content-building class. Concept, linkages, and — every time — how UPSC has framed it and will twist it.	STEP 2 • IN CLASS Annotate Handouts arrive with the concept in one line and blank space beneath it. You write the rest. Writing is the first revision.	STEP 3 • SAME EVENING Trap-check "UPSC traps" — True/False statements after every concept — expose what you only think you know. Before UPSC does.	STEP 4 • NEXT DAY Test A Learning Outcome Test (LOT) of UPSC-pattern MCQs on yesterday's class. Reinforced within 24 hours — then the loop repeats.

EACH PROBLEM, ANSWERED

01 • BREADTH The whole static syllabus, in one sequence	Polity, Economy, History, Art & Culture, Geography, Mapping, Environment, Science & Technology — 88 sessions, 264 hours, taught subject by subject from basics to high-yield areas on a published schedule. Done by 24 January, with 100+ days left to revise.
02 • RETENTION Three touches in 24 hours, not one in six months	Hear it in class, write it in the handout, mark the traps, then answer MCQs on it the next day. Retrieval — not re-reading — is what moves knowledge into long-term memory. By May you own a set of annotated handouts in your own hand, ready for final revision.
03 • PATTERN Practise the paper UPSC actually sets	LOT questions are written in the current UPSC idiom — "how many statements are correct", paired statements, description-based identification — and the traps in the handouts are modelled on how examiners actually mislead. Difficulty is calibrated to the exam, not to make you feel good.

Why it works: a full set of questions like these, on yesterday's class, in the "how many are correct" idiom recent papers use. You find the gap while it is still one day old.

Got all five? You still needed to *decide* — that is the skill. Missed one? That is the gap Sprint closes daily.

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WHO SHOULD JOIN

FIRST ATTEMPT • SELF-STUDY

**You have the will and the books.
What you lack is the structure.**

Sprint gives you the sequence, the finish line for every subject, and a daily test that tells you — before the exam does — whether today's reading actually stuck. Classes start from basics, so you do not need to have "completed" anything first.

Good sign: you have read NCERTs or basic texts and want to accelerate with discipline.

REPEAT ASPIRANT • MISSED THE CUT-OFF

You do not need more reading. You need recall you can trust under a clock.

Sprint replaces the annual re-read with daily retrieval: traps that expose half-knowledge, LOTs that test in the current pattern, and a fresh set of notes built from scratch — not the ones that failed you last time.

Good sign: you missed by a few marks due to strategy, inconsistent testing or the changing pattern.

WHY OFFLINE ONLY?

Because discipline is the product. A fixed 4:30 PM seat, peers who show up, and a teacher who can see when a concept has not landed — none of this survives a screen. Sprint 2027 runs at Karol Bagh, New Delhi, and nowhere else.

WHAT WE ASK OF YOU

The programme demands your full dedication: 18 hours of class, plus LOTs and guided revision — at least **25 hours every week** for the 88 sessions from 5 October to 24 January. Hold that line and you enter February Prelims-ready, with 100+ days in hand for revision.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Straight answers before you decide.

I'm preparing for my first attempt by self-study. Will I keep up?

Yes. Every subject starts from basics and builds to high-yield areas on a fixed sequence. What you must bring is time — 25+ hours a week — not prior coaching.

What exactly does the course cover?

The complete static syllabus of GS Paper I — Polity, Economy, History, Art & Culture, Geography, Mapping, Environment, Science & Technology — built and revised in 88 sessions (264 hours) through classes, handouts and daily LOTs — plus Full-Length Simulators (GS + CSAT) and PYQ Analysis Sessions. Is there an online or hybrid option?

No. Prelims Sprint 2027 is offline only, at the ForumIAS centre in Karol Bagh, New Delhi. The daily in-person rhythm is the programme.

Are the LOTs compulsory? What do they look like?

Treat them as compulsory — they are the revision engine, not an add-on. Each LOT is a set of UPSC-pattern MCQs (statement-count, paired statements, identification) on the previous day's class. LOTs are available to attempt for 48 hours only; after that they become unavailable. See page 4 for a sample.

What about current affairs and CSAT?

CSAT Full-Length Simulators are included. Current Affairs for Prelims is a separate course: the top 30 LOT performers (90%+ test attendance) get it with the fee fully waived; every other Sprint student gets 30% off its fee.

Is SFG included?

Yes — Prelims Sprint students can write SFG Level 1 and SFG Level 2, subject to the entrance test. Only the SFG registration fee is paid separately.

I've failed Prelims more than once. How is this different from re-reading the same books?

You will not re-read. You will be tested on every class within 24 hours, in the current UPSC pattern, and you will build a new set of notes in your own hand. Retrieval replaces recognition.

What is the daily schedule?

Classes run Monday to Saturday, 4:30 – 7:30 PM, from 5 October 2026 to around 24 January 2027 — 88 sessions, 264 hours. A LOT on the previous class follows every class day; Sunday is for cumulative revision. You finish with 100+ days to Prelims.

What if I miss a class?

This is a fast-paced course where discipline is non-negotiable. If you miss an offline class, Video on Demand of that class will be made available for 24 hours — so you are never more than one LOT behind.

Do I need to finish NCERTs before joining?

Helpful, not mandatory. Classes begin at the basics of each subject; a short pre-read is announced before each subject starts so nobody walks in cold.

Can I join after 5 October?

Admissions stay open for a limited window after classes begin, subject to seats. Late joiners catch up through recordings under the policy above. Write to admissions for the cut-off date.

Are there fee concessions or instalments?

Existing and former ForumIAS students get a 10% concession on the programme fee — email admissions@forumias.academy with your programme name and student ID. Fees are otherwise non-refundable and non-transferable.
